April 2003. A protem committee was formed in 1990 and the Section was registered in 1991. The IADR Singapore Section was formally established on 27 April 1992 with A/P Teo Choo Soo as its first President. The objectives of the Section are to (a) Promote broadly, research in all aspects of dental and related sciences. (b) To encourage development of improved methods for prevention and treatment of oral and dental diseases and (c) To encourage and facilitate cooperation and mutual helpfulness among local investigators in every discipline of Dentistry in the Singaporean context. Membership of the section has grown steadily since its inception and is currently about 45. Members come from diverse backgrounds and include staff/students of the National University of Singapore and National Dental Centre as well as private practitioners who are interested in research. Activities are focused primarily on advancing research and the dissemination of research findings. These include the organisation of scientific conferences, research evenings and workshops, and the award of travel grants to attend regional and international IADR meetings. A new and younger team has recently taken over the helm from A/P Yeo Jin Fei, our second President, who has led the society since 1998 till 2002. With the vibrancy of youth on their side, the new team is tasked with taking the society to greater heights and promoting a vibrant research culture in Singapore. SEAADE: Short History and Significance of the Association



he South East Asia Association for Dental Education (SEAADE) was formed in 1990 at the Singapore meeting of the 78th FDI World Dental Congress. The first council was formed in Singapore in 1990 with Prof. H S Loh as the first President and A/P S B Keng as the Hon. Secretary.

The idea of SEAADE arose from the need to improve communication between the various dental institutions. During the IADR (South East Asian Division) meetings in the late eighties, this idea was discussed and accepted. The delegates who attended these meetings proposed an association be set up to further develop the close relationship of the member countries in the education field.

SEAADE played a big role in helping with the organization of the IFDEA/Dent Ed Evolve world education meeting which was held in Singapore in April 2002. The Faculty of Dentistry played host to the successful meeting which attracted participants from 34 countries. The Singapore dental school also has the honour of having had 2 past presidents (Prof H S Loh and A/P C S Teo) and the current President-Elect, A/P S B Keng to the association.

Presently, the association is represented by major dental schools in the South East Asian Region. The 14th SEAADE annual meeting will be held in September 2003 in conjunction with the 18th IADR (South East Asian Division) annual meeting in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam.

outheast Asian Division

he IADR currently has 20 Divisions worldwide and is developing a structure that groups Divisions into 5 geographical Federations. The Southeast Asian Division is one of the IADR Divisions and will be grouped under the An-Asia Pacific Federation.

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

Whilst the main IADR was founded in 1920, the Southeast Asian Division, after several years of developmental gestation, came into existent on 5 December 1985. A group of researchers from several Southeast Asian countries met then in Bangkok at the Asian Pacific Dental Conference and formulated the first Constitution for this Division. The first President chosen was Professor Edward Renson from Hong Kong with active participation from several SEA countries including Singapore, represented by A/Ps Teo Choo Soo and Yeo Jin Fei.

The SEA Division currently comprises more than 400 members from 19 member countries within a geographical region stretching from the Indian subcontinent across the Southeast Asian region to the east of the Pacific rim.

The leadership of this distinguished organisation rotated amongst member countries and Singapore contributed to this leadership through Past Presidents A/P Teo Choo Soo (1987), A/P Yeo Jin Fei (1993-1995) and current President A/P Keson Tan. There were significant contribution to the global Association

when A/P Teo Choo Soo was appointed to the Board of Directors for 2 terms (1993-95 and 1998-2001).

Singapore also contributes significantly to the developing countries in the Regional Development Programme through the

services of members like A/Ps Keson Tan, Lim Lum Peng, Teo Choo Soo, Kelvin Foong and Stephen Hsu.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES/ IMPACT

The SEA Division meets annually with a rotation of meeting venues. Singapore has hosted the Division meeting on 3 previous occasions – in 1990, 1995 and 1999. The 1995 meeting was held in conjunction with the 78th Annual Session of the IADR. These meetings raised funds for promotion of research and programmes, including the University IADR Gold Medal.

The IADR Singapore Section was also formed in 1990 to promote and consolidate research amongst academicians and clinicians locally. Regular meetings are held in conjunction with the Academy of Medicine and others.

This year will see the 18th IADR (SEA Division) meeting to be held in Vietnam, Ho Chih Min City, in conjunction with the Southeast Asia Association for Dental Education. These meetings are scheduled from 23-27 September 2003.

The Division has come a long way to establishing quality, relevant and current research in this part of the world which is mainly in the developmental stage. With strong focus on research and development, the IADR is seen to be a very important platform on which the strength and focus on research can be amplified. The Council of the Division looks forward to your support.

Professor Roy Page NUS-SDA Distinguished Speaker 2003


'Bringing World-class Periodontology & Research to the Doorstep'

he invited speaker for this prestigious biennial event, Professor Roy Page, is an internationally renowned Periodontist, Researcher and Academician. He was the highlight of the Singapore Dental Association (SDA) Convention 2003 held at the Pan Pacific Hotel. Despite the temperature checks, the convention managed to attract more than 200 registrants. Prof Page more than fulfilled all expectations, delivering a full-day scientific programme tailored to help clinicians look at periodontics beyond scaling, root planning and polishing. He also packaged recent scientific insights and research data such that it had full clinical relevance and appeal to both generalists and specialists.

Prof Page also delivered a series of lectures over a period of 3 days at the Faculty. Topics covered ranged from the basic fundamentals in the pathogenesis of periodontal disease, periodontal risk assessment, diagnosis & treatment, to state-of-the-art research. As one of the highlights of the seminar, Professor Page demonstrated a new software tool (Periodontal Risk Calculator) developed by his research team for periodontal risk assessment in clinical practice. He also discussed and shared with the audience the research work he had pursued for many years in the development of a periodontal vaccine as well as his expertise and extensive experience in fostering research in a dental school.

Despite what was considered as an ambitious, exhaustive and intensive programme, Prof Page was able to satisfy the curiosity and individual needs that far exceeded the participants' expectations – it was truly a world-class performance. His humility, excellent presentation, exceptional organizational skills, stimulating and inspiring discussion was certainly well respected and applauded by all participants attending the programme.

There were three games after that: "Know your way around", "Rat Race", and "Group Survival". It was all good fun, with professors, graduate students,


